# STUDENT FAKES RESEARCH, GAINS ACCESS TOHOSPITAL BACKROOMSDebbie Jabbour

Montreal General Hospital has uncovered a bizarre case of fraud. For a full year, a young man claiming to be a student at McGill University followed

new doctors around the hospital under the guise of research. The young man convinced the hospital that he was involved in a study about stress levels of new doctors, and was allowed free access to restricted areas of the hospital, accompanying doctors and observing medical procedures.

Residents finally became suspicious over the length of the supposed study and notified hospital administration and security. The young man was subsequently barred from the premises. Authorities at the hospital acknowledge that the study was a fake, although they do not know if the young man was, in fact, a student at McGill. They have reassured people that the "student" did not touch any patients or treat or counsel them. They have also stated that they will be increasing security measures, including tightening the process for getting a hospital ID.

McGill University and Montreal General Hospital are part of a unique five hospital collaboration, the McGill University Health Centre, that provides training and research opportunities for students. Numerous research projects are being conducted at any given moment.

The puzzle remains, however, as to just why this young man undertook such an elaborate hoax. At the very least, the incident highlights the ongoing problem all universities have with the issue of academic honesty.

# **GHOST IN THE MIRROR**

I'm looking for the face I had Before the world was made W.B. Yeats

Sometimes, standing before the bathroom mirror, I find myself confronting the wraith. Like a swamp creature, he rises up to meet me as if from the depths of a great dark pool. In a gesture of friendship or demonstration of harmless intent or display of malice, he shows me his slightly crooked teeth, his abdominal paunch, his sagging chest. He has shadows beneath his eyes.

The bathroom mirror is not the only place that I've seen him. Sometimes I'll catch a flickering glimpse of that wary, bewildered expression in unlikely spots - the window of a nighttime bus, the back of a spoon, the surface of a silvered toaster. I've seen him in grainy home movies projected on basement walls, in an ancient Polaroid found wedged beneath the cushions of a couch.

I used to think he was confined to these out-of-the-way places, these lost regions. Lately, though, I've learned that he is closer than I thought; that we travel in the

same circles. There are mutual acquaintances. He's been seen at my barber's, my favourite coffee shop.

There are rumours about him, contradictory and inconsistent. So and so says that he has beautiful handwriting, but is unreliable and ill-tempered. Such and such has heard, from a reliable source, that has unpaid parking tickets and a weakness for women in red dresses. Some say he smells of garlic and is insincere. Others, that he has a slight tremor and owns eleven cats.

From what I have been able to gather, it appears that we have several common interests and affinities. Stilton cheese, for instance, and German ghost stories and country and western songs about highways and train wrecks.

Sometimes I'll catch myself daydreaming, inventing a whole reality for him. I imagine him shopping at Sears and organizing his attic. I picture him clumsily dancing a polka with his wife, or comforting his daughter after a bad dream.

Standing before him in the bathroom mirror, I sense that he has travelled toward me across vast, lonely distances. I sense, also, that he has come with the intention of conveying some sort of message to me. But perhaps the message is half-remembered, or he knows there is no language we share that can adequately express it. Perhaps he thinks I am not ready for it. Whatever the case, nothing is ever said. We simply stare at each other, in awkward silence, until eventually we turn our backs and leave.

# **UPEI STUDENTS MOVE TO LEAVE CFS** *York student union supports 'defederation' efforts*

TORONTO (CUP) -- Calling the national lobby group's efforts "woefully inadequate," the University of Prince Edward Island student union has moved to sever its ties with the Canadian Federation of Students, joining its counterpart at York University.

The UPEI student council voted in April to leave the CFS, following the presentation of a 35-page report that criticized many of the group's activities, including its tendency to lobby on issues not related to education -- a subject that has also been a sore point at York.

Brandon McKenzie, then-president of the student union, claimed the relevant contracts were not produced properly. "The revelations raised within the report indicate that our organization never entered into a binding agreement with the CFS," he said. "In light of this fact, combined with serious points of conflict and diverging principles between our organizations, I fully support the decision made by our elected representatives."

The current president, Clare Henderson, would not comment on what steps are currently being taken to complete "defederation," noting only: "The process is ongoing." The student union had previously tried to "defederate" through a referendum in 1996. It passed with 74 per cent voting to leave the CFS. But the CFS appealed the referendum results, and they were later overturned.

The York Federation of Students has declared their "unequivocal support" for the UPEI students.

YFS president Paul Cooper said: "While the CFS may have served us in the past, its tactics and extreme political positions it has taken over the last few years have caused it to drift away from the mainstream."

But the CFS claims they are puzzled as to why UPEI wants out. National chair Ian Boyko noted that CFS policies are all determined by its member student unions. "It's not been clearly articulated to us by the UPEI student union why it doesn't want to work with other student unions," he said, adding: "We respect their democratic decision."



# NAOMI KLEIN'S LATEST TAKES NO EXCUSES

The Take a window into Argentinean workers plight

BURNABY, B.C. (CUP) -- *The Take* is author and activist Naomi Klein's latest effort to raise Canadian awareness about the consequences of globalisation. The documentary offers viewers a glimpse into the lives of Argentinean workers displaced by the spectacular turn-of-the-millennium economic collapse of their country.

In 2001, as businesses went bankrupt and half the population slipped below the poverty line due to President Carlos Menem's "business-friendly" economic policies, Argentinean workers chose to take over abandoned factories and work in employee cooperatives. Set against the backdrop of this growing and unusual worker revolt, The Take follows the Forja San Martin auto-parts factory workers as they struggle with lawmakers in bringing their old workplace to life again.

*The Take* works best when it allows the lives of the workers to speak for themselves. In a brief sequence at the beginning of the film, Klein and her fellow producer, Avi Lewis, are shown as guests on various news shows, where their opponents chew them out for not providing a viable alternative to the economic policies they criticise. In fact, this is a problem that many activists from First World countries such as Canada face; their opinions come off as nothing more than bleeding heart impracticality.

Realising this, Klein and Lewis smartly decide to shut up and hand the microphone over to the Argentineans. It is much harder to dismiss the criticisms of people living through the devastating realities created by theoretical economics put into practice. One moving scene occurs when a worker's wife admits that her family has gone from being able to enjoy small luxuries like family trips to choosing between paying off debts and feeding their children.

The film shines when it shows what truly drives and motivates the workers. They do not possess a sense of entitlement; they do not act like the world owes them any favours. They are angry and sad -- at times crying tears of hopelessness -- but they are not consumed by these emotions, and they do not spend most of their time pointing fingers at the powers that be. They are driven by the love and respect they have for their families and each other. Near the end of the film, a woman describes with palpable pride how the workers at a factory co-operative allowed her sister to attend chemo and radiation therapy without a pay cut.

The film runs into some trouble, however, when it detours into a number of tangents regarding the 2003 presidential election and local legislative practices. The problem is not that these issues are irrelevant, as both have the potential to greatly impact the factory workers' lives. The problem is in the way these issues are presented. The filmmakers gloss over the legal environment that the Forja San Martin factory workers are struggling with. In fact, when it seems that other factories were simply taken over, without any regard to legal consequences, the filmmakers do not explain why these particular workers need to see the passage of a legislative bill before restarting the factory.

Regarding the presidential election, Klein and Lewis sidetrack to the controversial ways in which candidates try to acquire votes. It's an interesting topic, but it is one that does not support the main focus of the film. At these times, it seems that Klein and Lewis assume that viewers can make assumptions themselves, or already know information that really needs to be explained.

Thankfully, these inconsistencies do not detract greatly from the film. Overall, it is a worthwhile viewing experience. Klein and Lewis have produced an illuminating, moving, and tension-filled film that they can proudly take back to their opponents, showing that perhaps the greatest alternative to destructive policies is the will and determination of wronged people.

# Alberta Pays the Privileged Student

The Learning Ministry recently <u>announced</u> the recipients of the Grant MacEwan United World College Scholarships. These scholarships have a value of approximately \$28,000 for each of the eight recipients.

What is interesting about these awards is that nearly half of the recipients are from the Strathcona-Tweedsmuir School located just outside Calgary. I was at first surprised that such a high percentage of recipients came from a single school when supposedly this award applies all across Alberta. A little more investigation shows that this school serves only the children of the wealthy families in Alberta, with tuition at the high-school level costing over \$12,000 per year.

So while these Strathcona-Tweedsmuir students each receive over \$28,000 of the taxpayers money to pay for two years tuition and living expenses at a United World College, the Alexander Rutherford Scholarships, which go to public school students with outstanding marks, still only total some \$2,500 each. Not enough to pay for a single year's tuition of post-secondary.

How this works to aid the <u>Learning Ministry in its goal</u> to "ensure all Albertans have access to high quality learning opportunities," I don't exactly know. It seems to me that if a family can afford over \$12,000 a year to put their child through high-school, that child already has access to high quality learning opportunities. Giving them yet more money doesn't make sense.

# **BC Blowing Big Bucks Building Buildings**

The Province of British Columbia is <u>continuing</u> its course of putting extraordinary sums into creating buildings for education rather than getting down to the nitty-gritty of simply funding education and training.

The latest expenditure is in creating about 1000 seats at the College of New Caldonia and University of Northern British Columbia. This spending comes from the 105 million that BC has budgeted to improve access to post-secondary education across the province. As a cost comparison, Athabasca University's figures from two years ago are almost half that amount, and AU is serving over 30,000 students, more than the 25,000 additional spaces that British Columbia hopes to create by 2010.

The MLA for Prince George North, Pat Bell, said in response to this announcement "As northerners, we know the value that comes from training people at home." Unfortunately, he was not extolling the values of distance education, but rather just propping up the party line of more seats = more access. It seems that politicians in British Columbia are still unaware of the benefits of distance education, because they certainly seem to want to spend a lot of money on new buildings.

If you happen to be an AU student in Pat Bell's riding, why not give his office a call to tell him you agree with him. After all there is great value, both in the learning sense and economically, in training people at home. Too bad his government doesn't seem to actually understand that.

# **Statistics Canada Proves What We Already Knew**

Statistics Canada has recently released <u>a joint study</u> between the United States and Canada on the health status of citizens in the two countries. The results are hardly shocking but it's nice to have some confirmation of what we already knew.

For starters, poor Americans tend to rate their over-all health lower than Canadians, while wealthy Americans rate their over-all health as higher. Americans were more likely to have unmet health-care needs, especially at the lower end of the income scale, and cited cost as the primary reason. Canadians cited wait times as the primary reason for our unmet healthcare needs.

Americans tend to be fatter than Canadians as well, with American women showing a significant increase in the numbers that are obese as compared to Canadians. On the flip side, Canadians are slightly more likely to be smokers than Americans.

Given the options, I'm glad I'm Canadian.
