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

AU B. Admin to Close

The AU School of Business has recently announced that the Bachelor of Administration program will close to new registrations as of December 31, 2004.

The closure applies to the degree program, including all concentrations, as well as the post-diploma program.

Students who are currently enrolled in the program will be allowed to continue their studies as normal, and most or all of the business courses that are part of the discontinued program will remain available for students who are enrolled in the program, and as part of the new business programs offered by AU.

To replace the old BAdmn credential, AU will be offering more choices of business degrees, including a Bachelor of Management, a Bachelor of Health Administration, a Bachelor of Professional Arts - Governance, Law and Management, and a Bachelor of Human Resources and Labour Relations.

The Bachelor of Management "3-year degree program incorporates courses from each concentration in the existing Bachelor of Administration to provide a more well-rounded program of study for business students," according to the web page AU has posted to announce the closure.

The reason for the closure, according to the School of Business, is that the current B.Admin concentrations are being expanded into separate degree programs to offer more choices to business students. AU stresses that "these changes will in no way detract from the BAdmn degree you have earned or are in the process of earning" and that it is common for colleges and universities to revise their program offerings from time to time.


For those who wished to enrol in the BAdmn, AU recommends the new Bachelor of Management program, which "incorporates courses from each of the" BAdmn concentrations, adding that the four year B. Management will offer additional senior courses in various specializations. Students moving from the BAdmn to the BMgmt or the BComm will not be required to pay the standard change of program fee.

Transfer credit assessment from previous post-secondary education to the new BMgmt program is expected to be the same as it was for the BAdmn, however "evaluations on a course by course basis may change dependent on whether the courses meet a requirement in the Bachelor of Management." Students are urged to contact a Student Advisor with the School of Business for more information before changing their program.

Students currently enrolled may wish to remain in their current BAdmn degree to avoid losing any credits. AU will allow students to continue in the old degree for as long as it needed for a student to complete the credential. The closure affects new students only. It is not certain, over the long term, if all courses that are currently offered will remain open, as courses are also retired from time to time.

NEW ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES COURSE AT AU

Environmental Impact Assessment (ENVS 305)

Recycling. Environmental pollutants. Environmental effects. Fragile ecosystems. Do any of these phrases sound familiar? You may have wondered how scientists can determine that certain practices or actions -- like building a highway over a marshland, for instance -- can cause negative effects on our environment. Wonder no longer! As of June 2004, Athabasca University's Environmental Impact Assessment (ENVS 305) unravels the mysteries behind impact assessments, leading you on a truly fascinating journey.

A three credit course offered through individualized study, ENVS 305 discusses how the effects of various systems can be assessed in relation to the amount of change produced in the surrounding ecosystem. Environmental Impact Assessment (ENVS 305) focuses especially on the environmental effects of large infrastructures, such as highways, roads, power plants, mines, landfills, airports -- you name it!

After a brief introduction in unit one to the concepts, theories, and practices constituting environmental assessment, the course plunges into real-life issues with the potential to affect the delicate ecological balance of our ecosystem. You'll be fascinated with the story of the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline, and the impact assessments for the Red Hill Creek Expressway.

Carefully interwoven among these delicate issues are nuggets of information related to environmental assessment. You'll discover the role of not only the government and legislature in environmental issues, but also the public -- yourself, in other words -- as well. How are new technologies assessed prior to their appearing on the market for consumer use or incorporation into infrastructures? You will discover the facts and rules behind this complex facet of environmental impact assessment. ENVS 305 is packed with information you never knew existed!

Your evaluation for ENVS 305 is student friendly. In addition to the final exam (worth 40%), the remaining 60% of your mark is determined by a short essay and a more detailed research paper. The short essay is worth 20% and focuses on a particular topic you have studied so far.

The research paper, however, allows you to expand your horizons on a particular area of environmental impact assessment, using the concepts taught in the course in addition to information drawn from outside sources (such as scientific literature). Prior to beginning your research paper, you submit a short description of your research paper topic, depth, and additional information, for 5% of your overall course mark. This ensures that you can incorporate any suggestions or advice from your tutor into your final research paper. Your completed research paper is worth 35% of your mark for ENVS 305.

FROM MY PERSPECTIVE Registered Educational Savings Plans



As a proud new grandmother, I've been thinking a lot about how I will be fulfilling the many promises I made to my grandson while he was still in the womb. One of those promises is that I will do everything I can to ensure his access to post secondary education. Given that by the time he is likely to be going to university, he will need tuition funds in the vicinity of \$20,000 a year, any contribution I can make will be essential.

The reality, however, is that saving for education is a difficult task. I wish I could have done it for my own children, to prevent them going into debt carrying the burden of student loans, but I couldn't. When you are part of the middle class, struggling to raise a family of five, keeping food on the table and dressing them well, not to mention giving them a few benefits like dance and music lessons, there is simply nothing left over to stash

away in a savings account. Even that changed once I became a single parent. Struggling just to survive meant there was no longer room even for small benefits. When you have four school-aged children and are trying to figure out how to scrape up money for four sets of school fees, supplies, and clothes, saving money for university is a very distant wish on some far-away dream horizon.

Things haven't really changed. I'm not in any position to save for university, and I'll be facing significant student loan repayment myself. But I do want to do whatever I can to make life easier for my grandchild, so I've vowed to start some savings, regardless of how small, in the hopes that once I graduate I may one day find myself in a position where I can make some "real" contributions to those savings.

To that end, I've been checking out my options. Through my involvement with the student union, I've become quite familiar with Registered Educational Savings Plans (RESPs) and the Canada Education Savings Grant (CESG). As far as I'm concerned, these are benefits for the rich, and this opinion is reinforced the more I read about the topic.

RESPs are considered by many to be a good way to invest money toward education, and these investment plans are marketed to people by various companies belonging to a lucrative scholarship "industry." For many years, government regulations meant that if parents did not use these investment funds for post secondary education, a portion was lost - funds which the companies then re-invested to cover investment growth for those whose children did attend university.

In 1998 the government changed the regulations to expand the list of eligible post secondary institutions to include colleges, and under the new family plan, parents were allowed to transfer unused funds to another child or to their RRSP. The industry also received a boost in 1998 when the Liberals implemented the CESG as part of their "improved" education budget. The CESG provides 20 cents for every dollar parents contribute to a child's RESP, matching funds up to a maximum of \$400 yearly - meaning that the more you can afford to save, the more the government helps you!

Even though they received a huge financial boost from these new regulations, the RESP industry has other problems. The Alberta Securities Commission 2002 industry report has revealed that in Ontario, several companies have been barred from taking on new business, while others are required to make monthly reports. The same has occurred in Alberta, where five scholarship plan dealers registered in the province in 2002 were found to be in breach of securities legislation (*Edmonton Journal*, July 21, 2004). Where does the problem lie?

The Securities Commission stated that although the investments themselves are safe, the companies in question are guilty of misrepresentation, and misleading and aggressive sales tactics, among other issues. Individuals signing up were not adequately informed regarding what would happen if the plan was terminated, and returns

were often quoted as much higher than they actually were. Some sales reps said they worked for a non-profit organization, even though the plans and their distributors are very much for-profit. The Alberta Securities Commission is working with these firms to try to fix the problems cooperatively, but it certainly seems that those who have extra money that they plan to invest in RESPs need to follow the adage, "buyer beware."

I certainly don't need further proof that RESPs are not a benefit to help low-income and disadvantaged families send their children to university, but a recent Statistics Canada report has provided it anyway. It came as no surprise to read that this report has confirmed that even though the government has aggressively marketed the CESG over the last four years since its inception, almost half of all Canadian parents with children under 19 remain unaware of the program.

What about the 53.2 percent who were aware of the program? They have higher incomes, better education, and are more likely to own their own homes. Thirty-five percent of those with incomes less than \$15,000 were aware of the grant, compared to 69.5 percent of those with incomes of more \$40,000.

Of parents with a high school diploma only, 36.6 per cent know about the grant, compared to 73.6 awareness among parents with post-graduate degrees. Similar statistics were apparent in home ownership, with only 38 percent of renters knowing about the grant, while 60.4 percent of "mortgage free homeowners" were aware.

These findings support what many have been saying about these education grants from the start: they are a perk for the rich and those who can afford to save. Surely it cannot be that difficult to see the obvious? Individuals who only have a high school education, who make \$15,000 a year, and who are paying rent, cannot even begin to think about stashing savings in a bank account for their children to access many years from now. On the other hand, individuals with university degrees, making good money, owning their homes mortgage-free, with plenty of cash to spare and earning over \$40,000 a year, can easily put away yearly savings of \$2000 per child. High income, privileged families are therefore eligible to receive \$400 of government grant money every year, while low-income families continue to be shut out of post secondary educational opportunities.

During the last four years, the federal government has given \$2 billion in registered education savings plans to this grant program. Direct study grants for low-income students only amounted to \$474.45 million for the same period. Even more telling is the fact that banks and mutual fund companies have flooded the market with RESPs, considering these a lucrative industry. Some statistics indicate that it costs the government \$1 billion a year just to administer the RESP/CESG program (see <u>SUDS report, *The Voice*, August 3, 2003. v11 i36</u>). Add to that the Alberta Securities Commission report on this lucrative industry, and one really has to wonder why the government continues to insist that they are supporting post-secondary education.

In Alberta, of course, babies born during Alberta's Centennial next year will "benefit" from a government grant of \$500 to further boost the savings of those wealthy enough to start an RESP for their newborns (see Taking Notes: Alberta Government to Give \$16 Million for Education. *The Voice*. Feb 18, 2004. v12 i07)

I find it deeply disturbing that saving for university is big business, a lucrative industry that primarily benefits the rich. But in spite of my ideological issues with RESPs, and CESGs, if I can manage it, I'm not averse to taking some government money if it means I can help my grandchild access post secondary education. In all honesty, I doubt any savings plan or grant will make much of a dent in what he will be paying for university, but at the very least, saving toward that goal will reinforce for him the importance of a university education.

BEDROOM POLITICS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CUP) -- The Yukon has become the latest Canadian unit to recognize the equivalence of a same-sex marriage to a standard heterosexual union.

I could easily make this column into a celebration of the latest small step towards the complete inclusion of homosexuals in mainstream society. It is a goal I favour and champion to anyone who asks me about it. But that would be just another partisan view, hardly able to sway anyone but those who already agree.

The conflict is between those who want the definition of marriage to be gender-blind, and those who want to reinforce the traditional man-woman definition.

The gender-blind argument in this debate goes: "Homosexuals are essentially no different from the rest of us, so gay marriages should have the same status as straight marriages." The man-woman argument goes: "But a real marriage is between a man and a woman, so we should codify it in law."

The question is clear: What is a marriage?

That depends on whom you ask. I know one couple that can't even agree. She points out that after having lived together for one year, they are technically common-law married. He most certainly does not agree.

A stereotypical argument? Most certainly. But there was a time when even that definition of marriage would have set politicians on the rhetorical warpath. Whether it's progressive recognition of a changing society or the defence of conservative family values, the basic viewpoints never really change. It doesn't even really matter if you call the right or left. The point is that there are always some people willing to accept changes in society, and some who are not.

How we shall define marriage? That is what the politicians of Canada, America and Australia -- where the gay marriage debates are most vocal -- must decide right now. The legislators of these countries must work out what a marriage will be for their respective countries. It will affect how millions of people live their lives from the church to the courthouse, to the workplace, to the bedroom.

Hang on. Would you want Paul Martin telling you how to live your life in its most intimate detail, as a marriage surely is? How about Stephen Harper? Jack Layton? George Bush? John Kerry? These people can't just show up at my house uninvited and start telling me what to do with my life.

No matter your personal taste, distaste or disgust with any or all of these public figures, the very notion of public debate on gay marriage led by politicians ignores the most important part of it. Marriage is an intimate relationship. What our politicians think marriage should mean is only relevant to their own individual households. Only because they hold legislative power do their views on the subject appear to matter more.

Should something as impersonal as the bureaucratic machine, the government, decide on the most personal elements of our lives? The prospect sounds uncomfortable. The argument over the definition of marriage should not be led by anyone. It should take place in every household in Canada.

But how, asks the hypothetical critic, is this house-unto-itself debate supposed to be put into legislation?

Why, I respond, should we want to bind our most personal intimacies with the cold chains of law?

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CUP) -- One month from now, every patriotic sports fan will tune in to the Olympics. As for the athletes, the teams have been picked, flag bearers selected, and uniforms fitted. Their dreams have been dreamt and their excitement is close to unbearable. But many athletes must wonder if their achievements go unnoticed, hidden behind sponsor's logos, under a cloud of suspected doping, and engulfed in a world of political unrest.

The games were first created to watch individual athletes push themselves to new heights, and compete with one another -- to inspire one another. While still the case, the games now look like a battle between Nike and Adidas.

As sporting companies develop new technologies allowing athletes to perform at their "highest level," one wonders if such physical performance would be possible without millions of dollars in research and development combined with corporate competition. Take swimming, for example.

At the Sydney Olympics, Speedo unleashed the Fastskin swimsuit, allowing swimmers to break many world records. The suit marked a new level of technology that will be surpassed this year by Speedo's Fastskin 2. Adidas is also releasing a new speed suit for sprinters that keeps the body in optimal position and temperature while running. While these advantages in technology make races more interesting and breaking world records far more frequent, it also detracts from the accomplishments of the athletes.

Perhaps the biggest source of controversy this year is doping. Every year authorities claim they are cleaning up the games, yet steroid practices get worse. The United States track and field trials were perhaps the most discouraging sight of the summer, as brilliant performances by up and coming track stars were dulled by controversy.

Drug use among athletes is one of the darkest sides of sports, intensified this year due to the questioning of many of the world's top athletes. In the past 12 months, star athletes, such as Barry Bonds, Lance Armstrong, Zinedan Zidane, Marion Jones and many others, were heavily targeted and tested for drug use, having both their reputation and performance compromised. But as companies, like the now infamous BALCO, create undetectable designer steroids, it becomes impossible to believe that this year's Olympics will be clean.

This year's events are set in a scary political situation as well. Geographically close to some of the most dangerous areas of unrest, this year's games present a huge target for terrorist attacks. Several athletes have decided to skip the games simply to protect themselves. While this won't affect the participating athletes' performance, it is likely to become an issue that overshadows what could have been many interesting competitions.

When Athens takes centre stage and the torch is lit, the main stories should be about individual achievements, and exceptional displays of athletics. The games everyone wants to see have clean athletes turning in performances earned from an entire life's training.

The games shouldn't be about whether Nike sponsored teams had an advantage, or if one company's steroids were better than another, and especially not about how many snipers are positioned around the stadium. The Olympics are about the best athletes in the world, competing on the biggest stage in the world. As a sports fan that's all I need.

I am a 24-year-old AU student in my final year. Lately I've been finding it difficult to feel enthusiastic about anything. When friends call wanting me to go out and party I find myself making excuses. I'd rather just stay home and watch TV. I'm starting to wonder if maybe I am depressed. What do you think?

Good to hear from you Blake. Depression is one of the fastest growing maladies of our time. In fact 1 in 4 women and 1 in 10 men can expect to be diagnosed with depression in their lifetime. The fact that you took the time to write is a good sign. You are not hiding your head in the sand; you realize that you are not immune to depression.

I see, Blake, that you are getting ready to graduate, which means you are about to enter a new phase of your life. I'm assuming you are planning on starting your career, as you refer to this your last year of school. Along with any lifestyle change comes stress, which isn't necessarily a bad thing. Have you ever heard the saying "change is good?" As well, along with change comes growth. Each hurdle that we overcome in life, gives us confidence in

our abilities, thus raising our self-esteem.

The causes of depression are varied. It may be biological in nature resulting in a chemical imbalance in the brain, or depression could be the result of a stressful or traumatic event in our lives. For example, suffering from a chronic illness, such as cancer, experiencing the death of a loved one, financial difficulties, or anything that strongly influences the direction of ones life has the potential to lead to depression. In addition, some people may not have learned efficient ways of dealing with stress in their family of origin. Thus, they may have difficulty coping when faced with the challenges of life.

Everyone has days where they feel down or not interested in doing their regular activities. Having these feelings for a few days or even a week doesn't mean you are depressed. It is probably your body's way of telling you to slow down, perhaps indicating a need to reassess your direction.

However if these feelings are ongoing and accompanied by feelings of hopelessness, loss of appetite, an inability to concentrate, or thoughts of suicide, they could suggest depression. If you are experiencing any of these feelings on a consistent basis I would advise you to speak to your family doctor who can refer you for treatment.

Today there are various options available for managing depression. Depression is nothing to be ashamed of; it is an illness and can be treated. Usually a combination of treatments will be utilized. For example, drug therapy and /or individual or group counseling are some options. The choice of treatments should be decided between you and your family physician.

Lately I've been thinking about marriage. Not surprising, really. The media attention and public furore over the possibility, no likelihood, of same sex marriages keeps the issue front and centre with sound bytes, interviews, theatrics and predictions of hellfire and damnation.

Much closer to home I'm contemplating our 30th anniversary. When I was in my twenties I used to believe that if anyone celebrated their 25th they had to be a couple of old farts. Things have come a long way since 1973. We were married in the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Andrew by a young priest whose first language was not English. And that's okay. I'm come to understand that churches, priests, and traditions exist for a reason. Whether those reasons are still valid or reasonable is another debate and one I won't be tackling.

I do know that for many people marriage commissioners like me are offering an alternative. Each couple approaching me to officiate their wedding has their reasons for going the civil marriage route. Some have conflicting religious backgrounds. Some have no religious beliefs at all. For some it's a second marriage because of death or divorce. Some do it just to avoid the parental/familial pressures that sometimes drive couples to despair.

Often couples want a hand in writing their own vows or selecting quotes and readings that reflect how they feel. Many of them desire a theme or location

or options just not available to them with a church wedding. Perhaps there are children or a pregnancy to factor in. Whatever the circumstances we can make it work. In my mind, all things being equal, a civil marriage is preferable to no marriage at all.

Marriage commissioners are required to be open-minded and non-judgmental. I suspend my own beliefs because in the grand scheme it really doesn't matter what I think. It does, however, matter what they think. I do my best to ensure that this day be as special, memorable and stress-free as possible. I give the couple as much leeway as the law will allow. I bring to them the benefit of my experience -- both good and bad -- of things that can and do go wrong.

My role is to help two people who love each other make a meaningful life commitment. For better or worse, it's all about live and let live, from where I sit.

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
COYOTE UGLY Film Review By Laura Seymour

CANADIAN FED WATCH! NEWS ACROSS THE NATION...

Ontario on the Right Track

The Provincial government of Ontario has <u>announced</u> a number of changes to the student financial assistance programs in the province. At an estimated cost of 20.9 million, the Ontario government is taking some steps to make post-secondary actually accessible.

One of the changes put through is that the amount of expected parental contribution will be significantly dropped, thus allowing more students to get student financing, even if their parents haven't had disposable income to be putting away for them. This will be a significant boon to those families where, despite their best efforts, there was always a little more month left at the end of the money.

Another interesting change is that students who have exhausted interest relief and are still having a hard time making their loan payments, may be eligible for further assistance from the Ontario government in making reductions to the principal of their loan. This means that those students who perhaps took a risk at trying to go to post-secondary and for whatever reason weren't able to graduate or simply found themselves in a field where demand had collapsed, may still have the opportunity to get out from under the debt. While not as good as not incurring so much debt in the first place, at least this program gives hope to those who are looking at post-secondary and wondering about the risks of student loans.

The other changes are both in helping newcomers to Ontario be able to access the student finance system sooner and so get a start on their career training right away.

All in all, it boils down to a province that seems to have recognized that in an information based economy, the key to success is to ensure your citizens have the education to be able to use the information.

AU not part of Alberta Degree Council

The Ministry of Learning in Alberta recently <u>announced</u> the formation of their Campus Alberta Quality Council. This Council is responsible for reviewing new degree programs that Alberta institutions may want to establish and to ensure that quality control is maintained.

Notable is that of the 11 people on the Council, not one of them has a relation to Athabasca University. Also of interest is that while positions on the Council include two for Calgary and Edmonton, and one for each of Urban, South, and Central Alberta, there is effectively nothing covering Northern Alberta at all. The closest AU might get to an advocate on the Council is one of the two Out-of-province positions on the Council might be sympathetic to AU's attempts to expand.

Considering that AU is planning on a number of expansions in degree granting, especially at the Master's Level, we as students should probably be concerned about this. Will the Council be fair to the merits of each program presented to them, or will they be partisan to the benefits of their own particular universities or cities? Without a representative there from an AU board, we can only hope that the former applies.

If it doesn't, AU's plans for growth could be in jeopardy, which in turn means that our university would likely turn to where it always does when it needs more money.... to those of us paying tuition. So keep your fingers crossed with me.

Interested in Interest?

The Bank of Canada <u>released an update</u> to its monetary policy report last week. This update basically says that the time of super-low interest rates may be coming to an end soon. It predicts that Canada will reach our production capacity peak in mid 2005 and that in order to ensure inflation doesn't start at that point, they'll have to discourage people from spending. The traditional way to do that is to raise the interest rates.

This becomes important for those on student loans or with mortgages coming up for renewal, as it may be time to consider locking the rate in for a while. Of course, how much the interest is going to go up is something they can't tell us, as it depends a lot on what the international markets do and how much they buy from us.

For myself, I've always been lucky that my borrowing has been done at fairly low rates, but I've of course heard the stories from my parents about interest rates in the double-digits and people having to basically ditch their homes just to get out from under the interest payments. We can hope that our governments have a better handle on that kind of thing these days but I think it's only human to be a little worried.

Hey, maybe if we all slow down our spending now, we can make sure the rates stay low so that we can all still afford those things that really matter.

COMPUTER MARKING

For many graduate students, working as a teaching assistant (TA) is not just a way to supplement one's income, it is an important learning opportunity that can prepare us for a career in academia. These opportunities, however, are diminishing, and some attribute this to the role of technology in making computer marking the preferred choice on many campuses. As class sizes increase, it becomes more difficult for professors and TAs to mark by hand. Multiple-choice exams have been graded electronically for many years, but now the technology has been turned toward grading more complicated online tests

and exams that include written responses and short essays. The Intelligent Essay Assessor can be used to assess a student's writing skills and subject comprehension, providing an overall essay score and real-time feedback about grammar, style, and organization with a critique tool.

Not only do these computer marking tools replace teaching assistants and markers, saving money on salaries, automatic grading also has the advantage of providing instant feedback. This type of interactive marking can be used in laboratory situations where detailed feedback can allow students to resubmit work until they get the answers right. Allowing students to identify right and wrong answers immediately when writing an exam, rather than waiting days and weeks for a marker's results, is considered by many to be a far more effective system of learning.

Certainly many questions still remain about the overall efficacy of this method. Rating a student's written work still requires a significant human element, and the impersonal approach to marking cannot be used for more advanced work. As more universities embrace online course management, however, electronic marking will become more common.
