

Update on Gay Marriage Rights Around the World

In Canada, same-sex marriage is spreading like wildfire. One territory, the Yukon, and six provinces perform these marriages. Toronto and Vancouver are hot spots for tourism, especially from the United States. Couples are flocking to Canada to get married because, although it is legal in the Netherlands and Belgium, all of Canada's provinces and territories have no residency requirements, unlike the Netherlands and Belgium. Residency is only required for divorce in Canada.

Ashley MacIssac, the Cape Breton fiddler, says he plans to hold Canada's "largest gay wedding" in Alberta if he can find someone to marry. Previously the re-elected Alberta government under Premier Ralph Klein passed bill 202, which amended the provincial Marriage Act to include an opposite-sex only definition of marriage.

MacIssac hasn't found anyone to marry yet, so his plans are on hold. He is trying to find a TV company to produce *Who Wants to Marry Ashley MacIsaac* as a reality TV show. The outspoken fiddler has had previous drug issues.

Because of the rights granted in Canada, a couple married in Vancouver is suing the Irish Exchequer (Minister of Finance) for their marriage to be recognized for the purposes of tax benefits. The Irish Constitution, however, says that the state must protect marriage. The document does not define it. The High Court (second highest in Ireland) has granted leave for the couple to sue.

The Prime Minister of Ireland and the Archbishop of Ireland believe same-sex couples should be granted rights, but in what form would need to be decided. An all-party committee of lawmakers this month also launched public hearings into possible reforms to family law in Ireland, a predominantly Roman Catholic country where homosexuality was outlawed until 1993.

For some odd reason, the place was more difficult to find then we expected and we drove around in circlesfor some time. By the time we arrived at the old, two-story house, dusk had fallen to dark. The house almost looked like a façade, as it seemed so out of place, nearly unreal. It was completely unlit. A brooding brick church towered out of the shadows to its right and a row of newer houses trailed to the left. The front porch was big enough to be a room in itself, (which I suspected it was at one time) and it wrapped widely around the side of the house leading to a second door.

I couldn't stay in this house any longer, so I got ready to visit the town.

Nova Scotia Students Gain New Deal

The Provincial Government of Nova Scotia has <u>signed a deal</u> with the local universities that will cap tuition increases for the next three years with the promise of guaranteed increased provincial funding.

While many students and student organizations cry for tuition freezes like this, they often neglect to consider that expenses for universities continue to rise during a freeze. Without a promise of increased provincial funding, a tuition freeze is just putting off the damage, as we've seen in British Columbia where university tuitions sky-rocketed over 30% in a single year after the freeze ended. 

A Slice of Paradise

I no longer remember where it originally came from. It's written in red permanent marker on a piece of yellow foolscap spattered with a couple of decades worth of spilled tomato sauce, red wine, oil and who-knowswhat-else. For many years now it's been committed to memory, and remains folded at the bottom of the kitchen junk-drawer, but its instructions are followed by me or my partner at least once every couple of weeks, and it has been the been the basis for countless enjoyable evenings spent with family and friends. I'm talking about my "no-fail recipe" for pizza dough.

To me, food is all about sharing. And I don't mean just the experience of eating it, but also preparing it and cooking it. My favourite way to host a dinner party is to cram as many people as possible--six to eight is usually the optimum number for our kitchen--in their shirt sleeves and ready to get involved. For this purpose, pizza is the ultimate party food. It's a rare person, after all, who doesn't like it, and it's fabulously flexible. It's equally good for kid's birthday parties or adult get-togethers, a Friday night bash or a romantic dinner. Like a good romantic partner, it has the honest and unpretentious soul of a peasant, but if you're willing to

splurge for some exotic finery, it can show you an elegant night on the town.

This season, for a spin on the pre-Christmas pot-luck gathering, you can throw a winter solstice or tree decorating party by asking your guests to bring the pizza topping of their choice. Goat chevre, Portobello mushroom caps, capers, sun-dried tomatoes, zucchini, chives, roasted garlic cloves, and crushed walnuts have all made a recent appearance at our house. For something a little extra special, track down a chunk of good-quality handcrafted cheese and take a few minutes to blend up your own pesto sauce for the base topping, instead of just grating up some waxy factory-produced Mozarella and cracking open a jar from the supermarket. For something really transcendent, try drizzling the creation with a little truffle-infused olive oil (you can track it down in most specialty food shops). As an alternative to wine, a nice microbrewed beer captures the right spirit of refined earthiness.

Finally - getting more than one good pizza pan is a worthwhile investment, but any upside down cookie sheet, lightly oiled, will serve in a pinch, and make a nice crispy-thin crust.

<u>Pizza Dough</u> (for one pizza) 1 cup cold water 1 pkg. active dry yeast 2 1/2 - 3 cups unbleached all-purpose flour 2 tbsps olive oil 1/2 tsp. salt

1. Combine water, yeast, 1 1/2 cups flour - mix well. Add oil, salt, and remaining flour. Work together until dough holds shape.

2. Knead on lightly-floured surface. If dough becomes sticky, sprinkle more flour.

3. Put dough in lightly-oiled bowl. Cover bowl with plastic wrap, then let rise until doubled.

4. When dough rises, place on lightly-floured surface, divide into two or more parts, roll into balls, cover them with towel, let rest 15-20 minutes.

The dough is now ready to be shaped, topped, cooked, and eaten.

Japan Considers Female Successor to Throne

Palestinian woman to run for president

Redgrave Launches Her Own Party

Oscar winning actress Vanessa Redgrave has pledged to build a political party in England committed to human rights. The withdrawal of British troops from Iraq was the party's first pledge. It also called for the cancellation of all Third World debt, the removal of all weapons of mass destruction, and the repeal of anti-asylum legislation.

Peace Activist Acquitted

When the USA began bombing a disarmed Iraq on 20 March 03, Women for Peace and the Moreland Peace Group held a vigil outside the USA Consulate. On hearing the news of the bombing, Reta Kaur, 59, teacher and peacekeeper, started weeping, and in her moment of terrible grief, she wrote, "The Killing has Started!" in soluble paint on two marble statues outside the USA Consulate. She was arrested and charged with \$9080.00 in damages as the clean up cost.

Reta Kaur pleaded Not Guilty at the contested hearing, resolved by magistrate Magistrate Hodgens who found that Reta had no intention of causing damage, and did not believe or know that the water soluble

paint was likely to cause damage. He also accepted that she had offered to wash off the paint, but was arrested and charged. Magistrate Hodgens accepted that Reta was overcome with grief at the news of the bombing.

Private Parts

A growing number of women are asking their doctors for genital plastic surgery. The surgery can involve tightening vaginal muscles, plumping up or shortening labia, liposuctioning the pubic area, and restoring the hymen. The most popular of those are tightening of the vaginal muscles, or vaginoplasty, and reduction of the labia minora, called labiaplasty. The procedures are usually done on an outpatient basis in less than two hours and can cost from \$3,500 to \$8,000.

Doctors tend to hold aggressive marketing and fashion responsible for the increased interest. Some doctors warn that there is no scientific data to back up the claim that vaginoplasties can enhance sexual satisfaction and that painful intercourse can result if the vaginal muscles are too snug. Other risks are painful scarring or nerve damage that could result in loss of sensation or hypersensitivity.

Dear Barb;

My friend has just been diagnosed with Fibromyalgia. Until this year she has been a very active person. Now she seems totally incapacitated with this diagnosis. Is there anything I can do to help her accept and learn to live with this condition?

Margaret in Mississauga

Hi Margaret. I'll try to give you a brief description of Fibromyalgia that should be of assistance in your situation with your friend.

Fibromyalgia is becoming a fairly common condition, affecting two to four percent of us and occurring more often in women than men. Many experts say Fibromyalgia has been a part of our society for a long time, but only recently recognized as a genuine illness. The symptoms vary greatly from person to person and may include widespread or localized pain, sleep disturbances, headaches, fluid retention, and chronic fatigue. For some individuals their lives may be spent in a wheelchair after a diagnosis of Fibromyalgia, whereas

others function almost normally. Most patients fall somewhere between these two extremes.

The causes of Fibromyalgia are largely unknown. In many cases it seems to occur following a trauma, such as a car accident. At one point it was thought to be a psychiatric disorder, as there was no definitive test to diagnose this condition. However today there are tests a doctor can perform that provide a fairly good indication a person may be suffering from Fibromyalgia. I'm sure your friend has undergone these tests in the process of being diagnosed.

In my research I have discovered there are a variety of treatments for Fibromyalgia, which include medication, as well as mild aerobic exercise and daily stretching. If your friend has just been diagnosed she may have not yet discovered what will work best to manage her symptoms.

I believe the best way you can help your friend is to read up on Fibromyalgia, so that you will be more understanding of the way she is feeling. You said she was a very active person; therefore it may be difficult for her to deal with the limitations her condition imposes on her. Perhaps if she sees that you are willing to accept a less energetic friend, she may also learn to be more accepting of herself. Also, if she needs to discuss how she is feeling, be patient and listen. Sometimes all that is required to be a true friend is simply to allow a person to vent their feelings.

In summary Margaret, I would suggest you begin your research on the Internet and at your local library. There is an abundance of information available on this topic. Even better, perhaps you and your friend can do some research together.

Good luck Margaret, you sound like a very caring friend.

drawing exasperated stares from some of those seated nearby. The old lady reminds me of a favourite aunt of mine who survived World War II, three husbands and a double mastectomy without ever acquiring the knack of taking herself or anyone else too seriously.

-What's he going on about now, then?

-Oh, he's telling her he's madly in love with her.

-Well, who wouldn't be. She's beautiful, isn't she.

-Been around a bit, though.

-Yes. Been around a bit. Does that one have marzipan? I don't like marzipan.

-No, that's coconut. I can always tell.

By the third act, the courtesan has sacrificed her love for the nobleman in order to save his reputation. She's wasting away with consumption, alone and dying in her bed chamber. Carnival is going on outside, the sounds of revelry drifting through her open window. Too late, the nobleman discovers the truth of his lover's feelings, and arrives just in time to hold her dying body in his arms. I can't help but notice that the purple-haired woman is wiping tears from her eyes.

Heading back to the parking lot after the performance, we're carried along by the surge of the crowd. There's a thin, icy rain falling on us. I'm thinking about the fragility of life and love, about the sadness that always seems to be waiting just around the corner for us. The older couple are just ahead of me, the man gently holding the woman's arm. Standing under a Pizza Hut awning, the t-shirt woman's partner is waiting for her with an umbrella. Underneath a streetlight, they exchange a few words and a kiss before walking off, hand-in-hand, into the night.

THE PHOENIX RISES IN CALGARY

After awaiting five years for provincial approval, one of the most "notorious" private, for-profit universities in the United States will be setting up shop in Calgary, Alberta. University of Phoenix has announced that they will open an office in Calgary next March, offering the first two degrees--an MBA and a Bachelor of Science in business management.

The university's focus on education as a commodity can be clearly seen in announcements regarding the move, with officials citing Calgary's business sense &

strong economy as factors supporting the decision, stating that it is a "growing marketplace with a business-friendly environment."

The Canadian Federation of Students has spoken out against private universities such as the University of Phoenix, stating that they are "diploma mills" that "churn out degrees to people with deep pockets." Alberta Advanced Education defends the decision to allow the University of Phoenix to open in Calgary, arguing that this is simply a way to offer students more choices.

More choices can be a good thing, of course. However, one has to wonder whether making university degrees available to the highest bidder will actually benefit students in this province. Many of us may already be familiar with the University of Phoenix through pervasive pop-up advertisements that seem to be everywhere on the Internet. University of Phoenix may be an accredited university in the U.S., but in some academic circles, their for-profit approach to online education has contributed to the negative perception many still hold regarding university degrees earned at a distance.

Defenders of public education should be watching this development carefully.

I'm not sure if I love paisley fabric because of its richness of design and color or because it seems old-fashioned. At any rate, a navy, taupe, green, rust version covered the beds and window valance. A coordinating tapestry fabric covered the three stuffed arm chairs. The rich cherry wood of the furniture and mirror frames was another favorite of mine. Two not-so-bad art prints hung over the beds. The flecked navy carpet was still new enough and clean enough not to creep me out.

Though this certainly wasn't the poshest hotel I've ever stayed in, it got me wondering about the appeal of hotel rooms.

Mars Mission (1992) Film Review

From UFOs to possible life on other planets, this column goes places!

Mars Mission is really a videotape of a United Nations presentation by speaker Richard D. Hoagland. Talking to the honorable assembly would be pretty cool for me but to a former NASA scientist maybe not. He is easily the most interesting speaker I've heard in a while and makes sure that every base is covered during his presentation.

Richard begins with a basic history of the face on Mars and its discovery. He amazes me by giving credit where credit is due. He gives out team member's names and acknowledges their contributions. I rarely hear that from people. He states the process of doubt and the team's questions to themselves and each other. He shows us that this is not a group of gullible kids in a room going, "hey man, that rock kinda looks like..."

He then gets into details of the rock and planet and that's where the fun begins. We are taken on a trip to math class. Only this math kind of gets spooky. I'm not able to balance my checkbook on a bad day, and looking at the quantum physics calculations made me dizzy.

We learn what a tetrahedron is and what it has to do with the calculations of planetary physics. This shape is very important and anyone wanting to really understand what is going on should remember the shape and the basic repeating number. Richard makes that frightfully easy as he continues to show the repetitions of the number in Mars and Earth geography. We then branch out and see it on other planets and why it means something to those balls of spinning atoms.

Freakier still are the connections he touches on. Stonehenge, primitive man, planetary travel, crop circles and how they somehow connect into Mars again. Or is it that Earth connects into Mars? The most haunting moment for me was when I saw the illustration of Earth and Mars shrunk to corresponding sizes and how the Sphinx of Egypt, the nearby city and the Giza pyramids lay perfectly over the exact same shapes on Mars (face, tholus and pyramidal shapes.) How odd such perfectly coordinated shapes could fit on the exact same areas of land on two separate planets!

Now all the while the American space agency NASA has been disputing these calculations and the meaning of a face on a separate planet. Yet at the same time they will not investigate and we find out they have a seriously bummed up track record. The agency has been warned, investigated and cautioned by the government many times. This leaves little confidence in their willingness to look at the questions of a respected scientist in a fair and open-minded manner.



"The relationship between communication technologies and the city has been a long and complicated one, where the density of communicative activity has often been taken as defining characteristic of urban life. By contrast, rural areas have been idealized and marked by the relative absence of these technologies, a perception which tends to obscure the social and spatial consequences of communication technologies in rural areas. Out of this dichotomous set of associations has emerged a constellation of forces, ideas, images and experiences which have defined both the city and rural zones in unique and singular ways.

Popular music has been identified with contrapuntal movements that fluctuate between the celebration and derogation of both the rural and the urban. Within this interplay, various technologies, in particular electronic communication, have provided the principle forms of mediation between urban and rural areas, bridging and binding people and places in multiple ways and creating new hybrid territories situated within a shared mediasphere. In this context, the challenges of cultural production in and between rural and urban regions continue to be inflected by the specific demands of electronic/digital production, distribution and consumption.

This conference intends to address topics relating to the many debates and discourses produced by the intersection of cultural production, electronic arts/media, and social relations in urban and rural settings. We encourage artists, practitioners, journalists, writers and academics to participate in what promises to be provocative conference. In keeping with the overall themes of transmediale and club transmediale [BASICS], which investigate the aesthetic and ethical foundations of a hyper-potential culture, papers should address, but need not be restricted to, the following frameworks:

- * (Exo/Endo)Polis: electronic music, urban/ruraldynamics, and cultural politics
- * Refashioning Networks: circuits, nodes, communities, scenes and subcultures and extended milieu

* Mediations: the rural/urban digital nexus, imagining/ representing nature in the city/the city in nature; electronicmusic and the experience of nature

- * Counterflows: fluctuating movements betweenurban and rural music subcultures
- * The Best of Both worlds: bridging theurban/rural divide

* Splendid Isolation: productivity betweenseclusion, media networking and boredom; sound cultures beyond the majormetropoles

- * Perforating the Mainstream: marketing themargin
- * Opposing Urbanity: f(r)actions of rural subcultures in the metropolis
- * The City and Its Other: critiques from thecentre and periphery, speaking from and to rural and urban perspectives"
